



### Directions: Choose one of the following projects, or design one of your own, concerning the theme of this unit. Finish the project by giving a presentation in class and leading a discussion afterwards.



She says, "cooking meals, buying groceries." <u>8</u> Mrs. Zhai does this work with an eye on her future. "I've been <u>9</u> time in the bank," she says, "so one day people will help me." To these elderly, the age bank has made volunteers feel like family, and kept Mrs. Wang so spry she can teach me the China two-step—and so happy because even without family, thanks to the "Age Bank" she has the next best thing: people <u>10</u>.
